Low crime rates in Spring Valley Lake



San Bernardino County Sheriff's 2014 crime statistics show Spring Valley Lake has sharply lower crime rates than other nearby areas. The Spring Valley Lake Association reported a Part 1 crime rate of 1.1 percent, less than one-third the average in the Victor Valley. The Sheriff's statistics show Spring Valley Lake, with a popula-

tion of 12,000, had 103 part 2 crimes reported in 2014. That is less than one-sixth the average per capita crime rate of nearby communities.

The SVL Association attributed the low rates to 24/7 public safety patrols, security camera systems, Neighborhood Watch programs, Citizens on Patrol, Sheriff's and CHP patrols as well as residents who watch out for each other. To start a Neighborhood Watch program, call your local sheriff's station.

I occasionally hear a few complaints and gripes from people about SVL not being a great place to live or that they want to move somewhere else. Well, I am not a real estate professional, but I have been a real estate investor for 35 years, and to me, two of the best indicators of a desirable community are the local crime rate and increases in home values. Because of the great people who live in our community and on-going efforts by SBSO, COP, and your Board and staff, SVL is doing well in both categories.

Hopefully you had a chance to read County Supervisor Robert Lovingood's latest newsletter which mentioned SVL's low crime rate relative to the rest of the High Desert. No one is claiming that SVL is crime-free, but given our relatively large population of 12,000+ residents, our crime rate is substantially lower than other areas in the High Desert. Also, based on recent published data in our local paper (May 2015 Housing Report, Coldwell Banker), the sales data for SVL indicate a 20% increase in Sales Price and a 21% increase in \$/Square Foot compared to May 2014. I hope you agree, SVL continues to be one of

the best communities anywhere and is still the "Jewel of the High Desert".

Please stop by our Community Building and check out the recent renovations. The exterior and interior updating of our CB has greatly improved the look of the facility and adds value to our community. Look for more improvements at Meadowlark Park later this summer.

The next Regular Board Meeting will be held at 6PM on July 28 in our newly upgraded Community Building. I hope to see you there.

June was an incredibly busy month for the staff here at the association. Numerous large events, boat registrations, and capital improvement projects required the staff to go the extra mile. That's why, this month, my article is a tribute to our incredible staff!

Our Operations staff has been hard at work on the median, the community building upgrades, building the barge for the fireworks show, installing the barn mats at the Equestrian Center, as well as continuing to conduct regular maintenance. As you can imagine, working outside in these hot conditions is almost unbearable. With 100 degree heat and high humidity, it makes accomplishing these outdoor duties that much more difficult. Our Operations staff does all of this with no complaint and most have perfect attendance records! A very commendable accomplishment!

Our Administration staff has been extremely busy helping over 400 property owners get their boats registered. Sometimes our little lobby is standing room only! The Administration staff also provides critical support to help make all of our events a success. The staff pulls together to work the different positions at the Family Festival, Concerts at the Park and Beach and summer kickoff... just to name a few. They never hesitate to work on their scheduled days off when

Executive Assistant; my title was later changed to Director of Administration and HR and I have held the same position since I was hired.



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
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ALFRED LOGAN, PUBLIC SAFETY DIRECTOR

We want to take the time to thank our Citizens on Patrol (C.O.P.). At every event SVLA has the COPs show up to help keep our community safe. Every so often our Public Safety Department receives inquiries about volunteering for their community. Here is your opportunity!

"Citizens on Patrol are a generic name used by many to describe a special group of Law Enforcement Volunteers. As the name implies, Citizens On Patrol are Citizens who, after being screened, background checked, and trained by their local law enforcement agency, patrol their communities acting as "Eyes and Ears" for law enforcement. By patrolling their community, on a regular basis, usually in 4-8 hour shifts, Citizen Patrol Volunteers become more familiar with their community and are better able to recognize "suspicious" activity and notify the authorities. Due to their

focused patrol activity, it is not uncommon for C.O.P.'s to observe crimes in progress. C.O.P.'s do not take enforcement action; they only observe and report. Citizen Patrol Volunteers are not authorized to carry weapons and are encouraged to avoid physical contact. C.O.P.'s greatest weapon is their established bond with local law enforcement and their ability to communicate directly with them by radio or cellular phones using special dedicated phone numbers."


Everyone then transitioned over to the beach area for the Firework show which always leaves people talking about its greatness for many days to follow.

Thank you for your contribution to the community and for playing a role in keeping SVL a beautiful place to live.




New Guest Passes

We hope everyone enjoyed the spectacular fireworks this year. It seems that a good time was had by one and all.


Summer has come in with some high temperatures this year, and every-

one is doing their best to stay cool. The hottest months are still ahead of us, so this may prove to be one HOT summer. If you install a temporary swamp cooler or a window mounted air conditioner, please remember to submit an Architectural Project application for them. It only takes a few minutes to fill one out and get it to Ashely Yates in the Association office.

We have noticed a lot of dead trees in the community. The gardeners are saying some of the trees are infected with some kind of a beetle. The little critter bores a perfectly round hole to enter the tree bark,



and then eats the inside of the tree. This leaves the tree hollow on the inside. If you see your tree is dying, check the bark for round holes.



Per CSA 64 Water Company, we can now only water two times a week. Many

of the residents are going to Desert Landscaping to help conserve on water. You might call the water company and see if they still have funds for the Cash for Grass program.

During this draught period, we are not writing for brown, yellow, or dead lawns. We are writing for other landscaping issues, and hope you kept your yards weed free, mowed, and free of various debris.

As we drive around, we are noticing that many of you are leaving your trash cans on the street or in plain view. Please move these containers behind your gates, into the garage, or to a location that is not visible from the street. This may seem like a petty issue, but when it is happening all over the community, it then does become a problem. We thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

A Message From Your Water Agency



San Bernardino County, Special Districts Department Water and Sanitation Division

"It is hard to imagine that in 3 short years the state of California went from the drought being declared over, to 93% of the state being in severe to extreme drought conditions. To recover from this, all Californians will need to do more than hope that an El Nino winter will save us. Together, we are going to have to comply with the Governor's historic mandated statewide 25% water reduction order. Water agencies across the state are having to reduce water use by 8% to 36%; with Spring Valley Lake required to reduce water use by 32% by February 2016. In San Bernardino County, water conservation is a way of life, but in order to meet the state mandate we are going to have to do even more. Remember, every drop counts!

Every day we are just seconds away from a disaster! Earthquakes and fires can come with little or no warn-

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

It was a great day to have some fun in the sun and we thank all those who came out and joined us. We hope to see you all at the remainder of the summer activities.





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
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

is a code of honor in place when retiring an American Flag. The United States Flag Code (4 USC Sec 8 Para (k) Amended 7 July 1976) states: "The Flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem of display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning."

While it is not advisable that you build a fire on your property, you can none the less follow the appropriate guidelines by contacting the Spring Valley Lake Cub Scouts/Boy Scouts pack leaders. The Spring Valley Lake Scouts of fine young boys have previously performed this "ceremony of dignity" right here in SVL. This ceremony is a huge part of the scout's honored service to communities. While there may be other fine groups (VFW,

A CENTURY OF AMAZING

We are seeing a number of the Agave Americana this year in the High Desert. The plant is also known as the Century Plant. The one pictured here is boasting its colors and can be seen from the number 10 Green Tees on the golf course here in Spring Valley Lake. Others have been spotted growing on the college grounds. The life of the flower blooms are not specific, so enjoy them while they last. The name

"century plant" was branded because the blooms happen every 20 to 30 years and only once in that plants lifetime. The stalks growing from the center of a genus agave plant can be as tall as 10 or even 25 feet. The blooms will die and fall away but will leave "offsets" for future growth. The Century Plant was a source of soap, food, weapons and medicine for Native Americans. The plant is an ornamental here in Southern California, but in Mexico, the plant is used commercially as a source to produce the liquors tequila, pulque and mescal.

Numerous bees were seen on and around this plant on the golf course. Being kept at a distance, you could still see the inner beauty of the blooms. The amazing colors of yellows, oranges, reds and maroons made up the blooms while the stalk was a deep brown with hues of purple all coming out of a silver green base. Beautiful!



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
