
water-incident response methods.

I am often the first one you see upon walking into the association office and am happy to assist you in any way I can.

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
# DOUBT



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### PROJECTS AROUND THE COMMUNITY

#### The Center Median

As we are trying to complete this project, we have encountered problems getting the final amounts of DG and River rock. The county has purchased all of the same river rock we are using from local quarries. The state has purchased all the same DG we are using. This was just resolved using a close match from another quarry. The landscape lighting has been activated and the center median is starting to look complete.



#### **Community Building Facelift**

The Community building facelift is in its final stages. We have completed the exterior stone veneer, shades and the flooring. By the time you are reading this the exterior has been painted and the interior doors for CB1 and CB3 should be starting. Come by and check it out at the June Board meeting.

#### Restroom at FA 8 and Association Office Remodel

We have met with our architect on these 2 projects and we have locked down some required parameters. The Restroom project is looking good and we should be seeing some bid documents shortly. The Association office project is a little more involved. It will reguire more time than the restroom project before the Association bid documents are available.

#### At the Equestrian Estates

We have completed the Main barn flooring project and it has turned out great. It is a nice improvement from the dirt floor to a new concrete pad with 3/4 thick interlocking pads throughout the complete aisle. Thank you to the Equestrian Committee for your team work in helping us find the right solution; and to the Board for approving the upgrade in last years budget and finally on the project. We have also painted and epoxied the floor of the tact room.

Other projects we are working the results to date. on at the Equestrian Estates are:

- · Replacing the fire alarm system in the barn
- · Adding an emergency call box at the barn connected to PSD dispatch.
- Replacing the light fixtures in the barn
- · Installing the new Arena fencing.



#### **OUR LAKE**

We will be starting our chlorine treatment at the swim beach every other week starting June 2. Please note that we will be closing the swim area at 4:30pm on these dates. 6/2-6/16-6/30-7/14-7/28-8/11-8/25.



As required by the health department we have started our weekly test of the swim area and here are

For Total Fecal needs to be 200/100ML or less

Also you may have noticed new centerline buoys with new solar lights on top. These new buoys have larger bases and should remain upright and prone during most conditions. The lights are more sleek and durable than be-



fore. We are in our 3rd year of having lights on top of our buoys and they are working great. We have also just had our lake consultant on our lake performing there water quality, lake contour and vegetation study. Look for this on our website under the Lake tab.

# SVL Project Kicks off MWA's New Large Turf Removal Effort

Since 2008, MWA working with the Alliance for Water Awareness and Conservation has offered the Cash for Grass program that provides a 50 cents per square foot rebate for turf removed. To date, nearly 7.5 million square feet of turf has been removed resulting in an annual savings of 1,258.7 acre-feet of water with residential customers representing the majority of participants.

In November 2014, MWA quietly launched its Large Scale Turf Replacement Program with \$250,000 in local funding, and \$922,000 from the Prop 84 grant program administered by the Department of Water Resources. The large scale program provides a rebate of \$1 per square foot of turf removed. Similar to the residential program, this new program requires participants to replace at least 25 percent of the area of turf removed with native/drought tolerant plants.

The program, however, prohibits plastic barriers or concrete to be placed in the project area because it blocks water infiltration that helps recharge local basins.





This program, aimed at large turf removal projects, began with the start of the Spring Valley Lake Association Median (SVLAM) Project. The project, when complete, will result in the removal of 38,410 square feet of turf. The SVLAM project will also serve as a "drive-by" demonstration garden to encourage citizens to landscape with native, drought tolerant plants. With the drought in full effect, every drop of water saved is critical.


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I am happy to write that the Community Planning Committee will begin meeting on June 18th. The Board of Directors has prepared a Board Action Item Request for our committee to begin plans to update and improve the facilities at Meadowlark Park. We are pleased to have this major project to take to task. The working record of the Community Planning Committee is documented favorably and the Directors are assured that the park project will be taken seriously and worked thoroughly.

The committee worked closely with staff and Directors in the current design of the median. We did thorough research on design as well as drought tolerant plants and lighting and brought the MWA representative to our meetings. The committee was in-



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
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
