

The Facilities

Before the Equestrian Center was purchased and taken over by the Spring Valley Lake Association it was a family owned breeding farm dating back to the 1970's. It was recognized as one of Apple Valleys earlier show grounds that held many events and competitions to local equestrians.

Today the Equestrian Center is home to roughly 21 horses of various breeds. Although it has not been used in many years as a show ground for competitions, it is still used and enjoyed every day by our SVL resident boarders and their horses.

Due to the age of the facility we are looking forward to some much needed upgrades in the coming year like the gazebo replacement project, restroom updates and a fresh coat of paint for th barn and outbuildings.

The Committee is also working on a plan to have trees planted throughout the facility over a period of three years. These trees would provide essential shade in areas that accommodate horses and facility guests. Our goal in planting these trees goes beyond shade and cooling purposes, but will add aesthetic value to the facility.

Barn Etiquette

Recently concerns have arose regarding visitors at the barn that have not conducted themselves in a respectful manner and ignoring some of the appropriate courtesies. Please keep in mind these animals are very important to us, just as any other family pet, and their safety as well as safety of visitors is priority.

The barn is their home and a place they should be safe and feel comfortable. So please be respectful and mindful when visiting.

Dogs are welcome at the barn but they MUST be on a leash. If you have a dog that isn't well behaved on a leash its probably best that you don't bring it with you on your visit. It isn't uncommon for a horse to encounter a dog but horses are prey animals and can respond in fear especially if they have been attacked by a dog before.

Horses are delicate animals, contrary to the belief. Spooking or trying to excite the animal so it will run around can result in serious damage and should only be done by the owner. It is sometimes impossible to know just by looking at a horse if it is injured or not. Currently there are two horses in the barn that are recovering from an injury. It is vital that those horses under go a very strict rehabilitation process and be allowed to rest quietly. Please do not throw things at them. The barn is not a place to scream and yell at the top of your lungs. Not only is it disruptive but it might falsely alert someone of an emergency.

Most horses love children. Although horses are very gentle creatures some can be quite moody. Please do not let your children climb on stall railing or fences or tease the animals. There is a playground located closely by that is a good place to let your child run free, climb and get out

energy. The barn is not that place.

Do not feed any of the horses unless given permission by the owner. Horses with diet restrictions may have signs on their doors indicating "No Treats Please". Some horses may or may not have warning labels like "Bite Warning". These are all things to be aware of before you approach any of the horses to pet.

Be very careful when feeding a horse that your fingers don't become part of the meal. Look out for horses who's ears are pinned back as that is a sign they are unhappy.

Remember to give horses and handlers space if they are exercising or grooming their horse and always ask for permission to approach

and greet the animal. Never honk your horn at a horse if you wish to get the attention of the handler or horse.

We appreciate that when you do come to visit or if you reside here that you ALWAYS drive slowly on any of the streets here. Horses are frequently ridden throughout the community. Be aware of horse crossings or trail ends that force riders to use the roadway. Bridle Trails are not shortcuts or rally ways for vehicles. Violators are subject to large fines.

We understand sometimes things happen that are out of our control but the more we all do to be aware of our surroundings and behavior the better. We hope these tips can help everyone have a more enjoyable experience while at the barn. Please feel free to ask questions when you have them. Most are happy to share information.

Thank you for your consideration and compliance.

Friendly Reminders

The Equestrian Estates Committee and Boarders would like to remind those who visit the barn to follow the basic guidelines of safety and proper behavior when around horses.

These are a few tips we have for when you decide to stop by for a visit.

- Please avoid startling or provoking the horses. Horses do not like loud or sudden movements and can
 easily injure themselves when startled.
- Please keep children from climbing the stall rails or running up and down aisle ways.
- Please to not bring unruly dogs that jump or bark at the horses. All dogs must be leashed.
- Watch for signs of a grumpy horse. Ears pinned back are a good indicator that the horse might want to be left alone.
 Never approach a horse from behind where you are at risk of being kicked.
- Give horses and handlers space when they are out of their stalls. Horses may be getting prepared for a work or receiving care of an injury.
- Feel free to ask questions. Boarders and Staff are very familiar with the animals and their routines. Most love to share their knowledge and love for horses with others. If you are unsure of something, just ask.
- Please be aware some horses have diet restrictions, so do not feed a horse unless given permission by the owner.
- Remember to always have your association card or guest pass with you when you visit.
- Drive slowly throughout the Estates and be aware of horses and horse crossings. Do not drive on Bridle Trails.
- Always be courteous and enjoy!

Symptoms

Heat-related illnesses are progressive conditions caused by overexposure to heat. If recognized in the early stages, heat-related emergencies usually can be reversed. If not recognized early, they may progress to heat stroke, a life-threatening condition. There are three types of heat-related illnesses, which form a continuum progressing from one to the next:

- Heat cramps are painful muscle spasms that usually occur in the legs and abdomen. Heat cramps are the least severe of the heatrelated emergencies.
- Heat exhaustion is an early indicator that the body's cooling system is becoming overwhelmed.
 Signs and symptoms of heat exhaustion include:
 - Cool, moist, pale, ashen or flushed skin
 - Headache, nausea and dizziness
 - · Weakness and exhaustion
 - · Heavy sweating

- Heat stroke occurs when the body's systems are overwhelmed by heat, causing them to stop functioning. Heat stroke is a lifethreatening condition. Signs and symptoms of heat stroke include:
 - Changes in LOC
 - Skin that is hot to the touch
 - Skin that is wet or dry or appears red or pale
 - Vision disturbances
 - Seizures
 - Vomiting
 - · Rapid and shallow breathing
 - · Rapid and weak pulse
 - · Lack of sweating

Treatment

Take the following steps to care for someone suffering from a heat-related illness:

- Move the victim to a cool place.
- Loosen tight clothing.
- Remove perspiration-soaked clothing.
- Cool the victim by spraying them with cool water or applying cool, wet towels to the skin.
- Fan the victim.
- · Encourage the victim to drink

small amounts of a commercial sports drink, coconut water or milk, if the victim is conscious and able to swallow. Give water if none of these drinks are available.

If the victim refuses water or vomits, or has a mental status change, vision disturbance or a seizure:

- Send someone to summon EMS personnel immediately.
- Take steps to rapidly cool the victim as soon as possible by any means available.
 - Preferably immerse the vic-

- tim up to their neck in cold water, if safe to do so.
- Alternatively, place ice-water-soaked towels over the person's entire body, rotating towels frequently.
- If bags of ice are available, place them on the victim's body, over the towels.
- If you are not able to measure and monitor the victim's temperature, apply rapid cooling methods for 20 minutes or until the victim's condition improves or EMS personnel arrive. Give care as needed for other conditions that you find.



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We hope everyone enjoyed the family festival and spectacular fire-

works this year. It seems that a good time was had by all.

It just boggles one's mind how each week these poor trash containers get left in the street, on the driveways, behind bushes, and on the side of the garage. It would behoove our members to put it behind a gate, inside the garage, or behind the house. It would be a shame to get a notice for those trash cans left out.

We are still inspecting Palm trees; so if you have not had yours trimmed, now would still be a good time to have your gardener or a tree contractor trim the dead fronds. We have also noticed a lot of dead trees. Come in and fill out the Architectural Application before you have them removed

We hear all the time that residents do not know the rules. All new homeowners should have been given our governing documents. If not, you can access them on our website at www.svla.com. Here are a few of the important ones:

1. Easy Ups are not allowed on your docks, or front yards. They can be put up on your patios and backyards from April 1 to November 1.

- 2. ANY modification to your house or yard MUST have the approval of the Architectural Committee. You need to submit a Project Application in the office. Failure to do so will result in a \$1,000 fine.
- 3. No weeds are allowed. Many people are spraying their weeds and just leaving them. This is a good beginning, but you must get rid of the weeds once they have died.
- 4. All hedges and bushes are to be trimmed back inside the curb. Also, make sure they are not blocking the view of oncoming traffic.
- 5. Even though your yard my be yellow, brown, or dead, we still expect you to maintain it and keep it looking in good shape. Believe it or not, just trimming the bushes and mowing the weeds down helps to keep it looking so much better. Do not let the weeds take over. If you allow your yard to turn to dirt, then you must landscape it one way or another.
- 6. All sheds MUST have approval by the Architectural Committee.
- 7. Commercial Vehicles of any kind are not allowed to park in the driveways...period.
- 8. Trash cans cannot be visible from Wednesday morning until Sunday morning. Code will issue notices during that time.
- 9. Vehicles are not allowed to park on the landscaping for any reason.

For a complete list of rules and how to do things, visit our website at www.svla.com, and become informed.

Remember, Code inspecting is a legal process and does not

happen overnight. It takes time to get some of the violations cleared and taken care of. You can always call us and express your concerns.



Lake and Fishing Areas

Marina/Lake

· We have done a lot of sampling and testing and also looked into treating the lake to kill off the brown algae. We have sent in samples for another algae cell count to determine if the bloom is increasing, decreasing or holding. Based on secchi disk reading, we are up to 1.4' of clarity, when before, the Alum treatment and

the bloom had a full load of nutrient rich water (ultraeutrophic) we were reading less than 1' of clarity; meaning the algae was more dense. Our last water sampling shows that our nutrient load is holding at a historical lower level. Here are the latest results from our last water sampling showing the nutrient loads are holding at the lower level.
