



During this time the grassy area will remain open but the entire playground area will not be accessible.



The holiday season is quickly approaching and this year, due to Covid, there will be a larger increase in the number of residents who are buying gifts online and having them delivered to their homes. Unfortunately, this means that thieves now have ample opportunity to steal your packages that have been left out. To try and deter this behavior, it is essential to take precautionary steps to ensure your property is safe. If you have ordered a package and it is being delivered while you are away from home, try to contact the delivery company and request to pick it up at an authorized facility; or if possible, have it delivered on a different date. If the delivery company cannot accommodate your request, try asking a neighbor, a friend, or a family member to pick up the package for you once it is delivered to your front door. If you have exhausted all other options, but you still need assistance, call the Public Safety Department at (760-245-6400). As an extra service, our staff can provide assis-

tance by moving your package to a discrete location on your property. A Public Safety Officer will attempt to better conceal your package from the general view of the public and, as a last resort, the officer will bring the package to the Community Building where it can be picked up by the owner. Please keep in mind that this option is an absolute last resort as the Public Safety Department does not have the room to hold your packages for more than 24 hours. It is also important to note that if the package size is too large for a Public Safety Officer to move safely, we will be unable to accommodate your request. If you are having us hold a package for you, know that you will be required to show your picture ID to retrieve it and it will only be released to the individual that the package is addressed to. This is a special courtesy that the Association is only providing during the holiday season and we will not be responsible for any damages that might occur.

BCC Wins National Honor with The Trade Technician Jump Start Program BCC gets "Workforce Ready" with innovative programming

Barstow, CA -- Barstow Community College (BCC) was declared a national winner in the 2nd annual NACCE 2020 Pitch for the Trades competition sponsored by the Philip E. & Carole R. Ratcliffe Foundation. With a goal of empowering job creation and entrepreneurs in the local region, BCC competed in the National Association for Community College Entrepreneurship nation-wide contest with the newly created and innovative Trade Technician Jump Start Project.

The Trade Technician Jump Start Certificate Program is a non-credit, no cost, hands-on experience course designed to teach students the basic principles and core skills in 8 highdemand trades that touch nearly every industry and business in our local community. The program, designed to engage high school students, adults, high risk youth, unemployed, veterans, homeless and those seeking retraining experience opportunities will learning that includes OSHA safety standards, hand and power tools, construction basics and drawings, welding, plumbing, electrical, HVAC and customer service. Students can enter the workforce immediately by applying for entrylevel, living wage jobs in any business sector. The program also entrepreneurship includes an component for those that are interested in starting a business of their own.

Upon completion of the no-cost program, students will have the opportunity to apply employment through BCC's job placement program or participate in paid internship programs with industry partners, including PG&E who helped champion the formation of the Jump Start Program. A winning strategy for this program was the collaboration with regional employers in finding internships or gainful employment for student completers.

The winning BCC team led by Dr. Crystal Nasio, Dean of Instruction, Economic and Workforce development, competed in threerounds of "pitches" to get to the finals. Team members include faculty from the career and technical education area--Toby Hill, Josh O'Neal, Roland O'Neal, Denise Pasley and included PG&E, Senior Technical Project Manager, Jessica Bails.

BCC was one of 5 community colleges in the nation to receive this prestigious honor. Other winning colleges include the City College of San Francisco (California); Catawba Valley Community College (North Carolina); Washtenaw Community College (Michigan); and North Idaho College (Idaho)

"We are extremely proud of our BCC faculty and staff for competing on a national level and for working with our local business partners to deeply understand the skills and knowledge that are necessary for their entry-level employees and for career advancement of their existing employees. We are also incredibly grateful to the National Association of Community

College Entrepreneurship and the Ratcliffe Foundation for sponsoring this competition which helped us to refine how we communicate the private universities, government and value of our program and to learn about other innovative community college programs across the country. BCC is quickly becoming known as a regional leader in innovation and entrepreneurial efforts. In fall 2019, the college was chosen to sponsor an entrepreneurial workshop series in collaboration with the Small Business Development Center of Orange County and Inland Empire. In August, BCC was awarded the Growing coveted Inland Achievement Innovation award, for a project that cultivates creative confidence and the entrepreneurial mindset for students in middle school and will be part of the college's growing outreach efforts. The college has also become a Media Contact: leading partner in establishing and an Innovation growing Entrepreneurship ecosystem that AMANDA SIMPSON engages regional California community colleges, state and

military partners, local and regional business leaders. innovators. entrepreneurs, and non-profit organizations to spur regional economic development and to collaboratively solve real-life challenges within our Inland Empire communities.


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

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

On October 20, 1969, the Boise Cascade property sales office as well as the accompanying buildings were completed and officially opened. The entrances to the new development are planned, and the actual plot design is completed. The original drawing shown here is the same "blue map" in use today. These plans include the (potential) country club and golf course. On the original plans, an elementary school was planned where Meadowlark Park is (instead) today. The project was built on the Kalin Cattle Ranch that stretched from

Bear Valley Road to close to the Mojave River Narrows, and eastward to Apple Valley Rd. At the same time, The Sage Hen Ranch, a retreat that had been in place since 1936, was still very active within the sphere of the Spring Valley Lake project. It is said that famous people retreated there to get away from the everyday hustle and bustle of their lives. According to the CC&R's, the annexation of the land where the Sage Hen Ranch stood, was signed and completed in January 1991.



(Original Master Plan Drawing)


(First home built on Sage Hen Road)



Construction of the SVL Country Club began in June of 1970, designed by Cliff May, and was completed on June 28, 1971. Boise Cascade held ownership of the club and golf course until May 1975 when C.C.A. purchased the operation.
