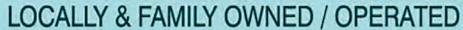

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I briefly touched on this on social media, but I wanted to take a moment to fully reflect on something truly remarkable that happened about a month ago. I was asked by the office staff to stop by and sign some paperwork on behalf of the Association. As I was heading in, I noticed several Public Safety officers gathered on a street corner along Country Club.

When I arrived at the office, I asked if there was something special going on that day, thinking perhaps there was a drill or some event. It turned out that a homeowner on Country Club had heard her doorbell ring, but couldn't get to it immediately. When she later checked her Ring camera, she saw a video of a toddler, around 3-4 years old, who had rung the bell and then wandered off camera. Alarmed, she rushed to the door, but found no trace of the child or anyone else.


She immediately called Public Safety, and within 10 minutes, all on-duty personnel were mobilized to help locate the child. Vicki Fitch, who was in the office with me at the time, joined the search, along with a large number of volunteer homeowners. As I searched my assigned nearby street, I estimated that at least 50 people were out looking for the toddler.

So, why do I describe this as something remarkable? First, it turns out the toddler was never in any real danger—he had wandered out of his garage after a repairman left the door open, but he was never truly alone. Unaware of the situation, the child's mother had taken him back inside and closed the garage, missing the Public Safety officers who were knocking door-to-door in their search.

Here's the remarkable part: Within just 15 minutes, 50 people were out on the street searching for this child. If the situation had required it, I'm confident the number would have grown into the hundreds. How many communities do you know that could mobilize such an effort, coordinated so efficiently by Public Safety and the office staff, in such a short amount of time? As we all know, in cases of missing children, the first few minutes are often the most critical.

Two important points need to be made: First, there was no negligent parenting involved here—just a very understandable misunderstanding. Second, we often focus on what Public Safety can't do, sometimes overlooking the incredible things they can accomplish that even the police might struggle with. While I wish we could guarantee that no

catalytic converters would ever be stolen in our neighborhood again, this experience last week gave me a renewed sense of confidence in our community's safety. It also reminded me to appreciate what we have, rather than focus on what we lack.



The Operations Department is always working diligently on maintaining SVLA's stature as well as keeping up on regular training videos to ensure we are delivering the best service possible. If you ever notice a maintenance related issue or concern around the community, please call the Association Office (@760-245-9756) and we will do our due diligence to correct the issue(s) or concerns.

The LPO permit has finally been approved, and we are currently finalizing the fees.

We have begun to do biweekly inspections on the v-ditches throughout the community. We are hoping to be able to stay on top of these and keep them clear of debris. If you live near a v-ditch and you notice excessive debris, please do not hesitate to let us know so we can address it right away.

With the season winding down, we're maintaining our commitment to lake care. This month we're continuing our enhanced lake cleaning three times a week and daily clean-ups to keep the waters clear. We're also intensifying our lake samplings and ongoing Harmful Algae Bloom (HAB) monitoring to ensure the safety and well-being of our community as we move into fall.

Summer is coming to an end. Hopefully, the high temperatures will be ending too; so the community can enjoy our amenities without frying. If your plants or lawn received a little too much sun, you may want to consider submitting an architectural application to get some desert tolerant landscaping. If you are not sure what kind of plants will thrive in our community, our website svla. com has a guide to high desert landscaping that may have useful suggestions to browse. Once you have a plan of what you want to do, create a design detailing your plan and make an appointment through our website to submit it. A code enforcement officer will meet with you and discuss any issues or items that do not conform with our rules to better assist in getting the project through the architectural process.

Our annual inspections are still underway. If there are any issues with your home that are on our checklist, consider addressing them promptly to avoid any notices and for a chance for your home to be highlighted in the breeze. We appreciate the efforts you make to keep your home and our community looking amazing.

The most common violations our officers see are trash cans left out past the allotted time, weeds, and projects started/completed without approval by the Architectural Committee. If a resident has any questions about a courtesy notice or violation, we recommend you call the code enforcement office so an officer may assist you.

The Code Enforcement department also wants to remind residents that decorations can only be put up 30 days before and taken down 30 days after the holiday. Sadly, this means no skeletons or Jack O'Lanterns are allowed to be up this month, but we look forward to seeing what creative things our community up with in October.


This summer, we introduced wristbands for residents visiting the beach area on Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays.

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



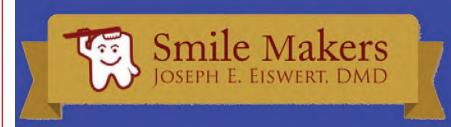
